Focus on the future -Melkonian celebrates 78 years

For 78 years, the historic buildings of the Melkonian Educational Institute in Nicosia had stood as silent guardians of an evolving society, welcoming millions of visitors to the capital.

The diverse international background of the academic staff and more than 200 students that attend each year, has added "spice" to the already colourful society of Cyprus, with the word "Melkonian" synonymous with diversity and fellowship, while the school has also contributed significantly to the economy.

Managed by the New York-Armenian General based Benevolent Union, the school has fallen on trying times in recent years, struggling to cope with a rapidly evolving worldwide Diaspora subject to political upheavals in many countries. This has also been a great financial burden on the school that until recently had to rely on the contributions of its main sponsor to survive.

Now. the Worldwide Alumni are making efforts to raise funds to sustain the school and safeguard its financial independence.

This year's [2003] graduating class of 27 students, while all of Armenian descent were also an international mix — a quasi United Nations in its composition. Between them — apart from Armenian — the students spoke seven languages and brought to Melkonian a diverse array of cultures and traditions.

Established in 1926 by the Krikor and Garabed Melkonian brothers, MEI is AGBU's largest education institution which has been a magnet for generations of young Armenians from across the Middle East, and of late, Eastern Europe, Armenia and Russia.

Heritage" protection for the school's facilities.
